

SOLID GROUND

Replacement of field turf at Sid Cichy Stadium supplies open lane for the installation of a new track

In a year's time, Shanley High School will have a sense of pride in their stride.

The need to replace the field turf ushers in a new era for Shanley—a dedicated on-campus track for the first time in its history.

The "Sprint to Victory" project is a part of future school expansion plans and comes at a cost of \$1.5 million. JPII Advancement Director John Klocke announced the project at the Shanley Athletic BBQ on August 28th.

The type of field turf that Shanley utilizes needs replacement about once a decade and the 2022 season will be the last for the Deacons on this surface. "We're on year thirteen actually," Klocke said, "the surface is still safe and playable but this is the last year."

When Shanley was in North Fargo, a football practice field was in place, but a dedicated track has always been lacking. "Originally the plan was to include a track when we first built the stadium," Klocke noted, "but even though it didn't come to fruition all those years ago, it will be cost-effective and timely for us to incorporate this installation into our entire project."

JPII President Mike Hagstrom credits leaders within the program for helping the project to the starting blocks. "As we reviewed our building expansion plans, Track Coach Chris Foerster pressed for a track option around the turf field but that proved to be logistically impossible." Hagstrom said. "From there, Mr. Foerster brought the quandary to alumni parents Greg McCormick and Jeff Collins who emerged with a solution to move the turf field to the east. I really thank them all for making the vision of a home track a real possibility at Shanley-Sacred Heart."

Klocke notes that the football field itself will be moved about 30 feet toward Bishop's Boulevard and there will be no need to change the layout of the stands, lights, or scoreboard. The track will be a standard eight-lane layout, 400m in circumference, and made of state-of-the-art material. "It's a source of pride to say that for the first time we will host our own Shanley Invitational." Klocke noted the new layout will result in no change to softball or soccer and elementary schools will not have to make the trip each May to Concordia. Klocke said, "we'll build those special memories right here on our campus."

Klocke calls early support for the project encouraging with a goal to raise cash and pledges by December 31st of this year so that construction bids can open by February 1st. The timeline goal is for groundbreaking in early spring with a completion in time for next August.



SHANLEY ATHLETIC CLUB CHANCE CHANCE CHANCE CHANCE CHANCE INDUCTEE: JUSTIN PAULSON

A TRUE DEACON.

When one looks up the definition of the word "deacon" in the dictionary – no matter which dictionary - the common thread describing this word is the word "servant". Someone who serves, ministering to others in practical ways. This servant leadership epitomizes the generous and dedicated contributions made by Justin Paulson, not only while serving in his role on the Shanley Athletic Club board but also as a parent supporting his children and their fellow students throughout their Catholic school educational experience.

Justin graduated from Hankinson High School in 1978 and the University of North Dakota in 1982. He met his "sweetie" Wendy in Jamestown and they have been married for 35 years. They currently live in West Fargo.

Their two daughters attended the Fargo Catholic School system from starting at Nativity through to graduation from Shanley. Mara graduated from Shanley in 2008 and Beth graduated in 2010. Mara was involved with various sports and Beth was involved in band and musicals. Justin and Wendy loved nothing more than watching all their daughters' activities throughout their years in school.

Currently, Mara and her husband, Scott live in Overland Park, Kansas and just had a daughter whose name is Ruthie. Beth lives in Coon Rapids, MN and has two children, Hudson who is 5 and Hadley who just turned four.

WHY FARGO CATHOLIC SCHOOLS?

When asked why they chose to send their daughters to the Fargo Catholic Schools, Justin replied; "When we discussed whether to send our kids the Fargo Catholic School system we knew there was a financial component. Wendy attended Catholic schools growing up and graduated from the College of St. Catherine in St. Paul, Minnesota. I attended St. Francis Academy in Hankinson, North Dakota until it closed after my fifth grade. Therefore, we both understood the value of a Catholic education and understood what the Fargo Catholic Schools could bring to our children. As I look back, we made the correct decision."

Another factor impacting this decision was Justin remembering that when he was growing up his Mom always followed Shanley. Whenever they were on TV it was a big deal. His mom was also a big Roger Maris fan. Because of this, Justin has always held Shanley to high regard. He thought it would be neat to have his kids go to a school that he had watched from afar and admired when he was younger.

MAKING AN IMPACT BY GIVING BACK

Justin served on the Shanley Athletic Board for six years starting around 2005. He wanted to get involved and remembers being nervous to apply and was surprised and excited to be elected. Justin shared; "I wasn't completely sure what I was getting into. It was nice being around individuals committed to Shanley athletics."

Once on the board, Justin got a feel for what was needed for our athletic teams and it was obvious to him that the more funds that SAC could raise, the more they could help. So, he was drawn to finding ways to generate more money.

This being the motivating factor for Justin, his efforts turned out to be instrumental in developing and strengthening our current Ad Sales program that has since become an integral part of the annual fundraising efforts for the Shanley Athletic Club.

"I was drawn toward raising money so that SAC could fund more projects that helped our Shanley athletic teams. There was an opportunity to work on selling advertising for our publications. The advertising dollars had dropped off in the prior years.

I decided to create a more standardized sponsorship level. We tried to make it easier for sponsors to choose an advertising type and for SAC to administer the program. I redid the forms and streamlined the process. We added more advertising levels which brought in more dollars. We paid a salesperson to sell the ads and I did the documenting, invoicing, collecting, and overseeing. I created a database and invoice system to track activity and report back to the SAC board."

Because of Justin's efforts and working together with his fellow board members, SAC's advertising revenues were greatly increased. If sales weren't going as fast as needed, Justin would start making selling calls himself. He implemented an index page in our publications to recognize all the SAC sponsors. Through this process, SAC also implemented the idea of having a recognition night for all sponsors at one of the home basketball games.

"I also thought we could do better with SAC individual memberships. I started sending out personalized notes with the membership form to parents using the school directory giving them an option at various sponsorship levels. Because of these efforts, the individual memberships in SAC greatly increased. Most ended up being multiyear memberships."

Justin carried these responsibilities all the years he served on the board. It was not just his individual efforts but also the processes he created and handed down to future board members that made the difference and set the table for advertising and membership revenues to increase year after year.

While on the board, Justin also volunteered and worked at Shanley golf and track events, assisted in putting the publications together, scheduled halftime events at basketball games, took tickets at the entrance and worked in the concession stand.

THE TRUE GIFT OF GIVING

Whether it is monetary gifts or gifts of time and talent, we all know that when one gives to others they get so much more back in return. When asked, Justin shared this sentiment; "It feels good to help. It feels good to help Shanley and Shanley students and teachers. I met many lifelong friends."


Justin recommends that all parents consider investing their time, talent, and treasures in our kids. "Our coaches and Shanley athletics need volunteers. Our dedicated coaches and athletic department put in many hours with our kids. The SAC is a great way to meet others in the system. It really doesn't take a whole lot of time. Take Hava BELIKE JAK

Hard working. Personable. High character. Humble. These qualities quickly come through when you meet Jake Kava. The more you get to know Jake, another quality becomes glaringly clear...successfulness.

EARLY SUCCESS

A 2018 Shanley graduate, Jake was a multi-sport athlete earning all-state honors in basketball his senior year and in football his sophomore, junior, and senior year. "Going into my junior and senior year, I was still deciding whether I was going to play basketball or football in college, but let's be honest, there's a lot more room for 6'1", 250-pound guys on the football field than on basketball courts," he says with a laugh. "I had opportunities to play at a higher level in football."

Those opportunities would keep him close to home playing for NDSU, but a young Jake Kava didn't see that in the playbook. "Growing up, I could not stand the Bison," he confesses. "For my eighth birthday, my parents bought me a Gopher football season ticket. Our next-door neighbors also had season tickets, so I had my ticket and would go with them to games."

Jake proudly sang the praises of his Gophers to his Bison-loving buddies until 2013, when the Bison upset the Gophers in Minneapolis. "I was talking so much crap before the game," Jake recalls with a smile. The team and Bison Nation made an impact on the future Bison. "I think that was the first time I realized there's something special about that program."



As Jake looked to the future of his playing career, NDSU became a clear choice. "It's a no-brainer for local kids," he says. "You want to go to a good program? This is the place that offers success on all levels. Personally, teamwise, all levels."

SUCCESS ON THE FIELD

Jake entered the Bison program as a linebacker and red-shirted the 2018 season. Ready to hit the field in 2019, the team experienced some injuries that required some position shuffling. "Coach Entz brought me into his office and asked, 'what would you say to playing defensive end?'"

Jake's main goal was to be on the field. "Linebackers play the whole game; they don't have a sub. Defensive end and defensive line rotate," he explains. "Math-wise, there's a better chance of getting on the field as a defensive end, so I said, 'absolutely,' and the rest is history."

Jake played in 12 of 16 games during his freshman year. In 2020 with the anticipation of stepping in to fill the shoes available due to graduation, COVID hit, which created its own chaos, but Jake also got hurt.

"I was doing a punt defensive drill, running down by myself, no contact, and I completely tore my ACL and my Meniscus. If there's ever a good time to tear your ACL, I think I found the right time," Jake says with a smile of the opportunity to rehab for close to a year before playing as opposed to his teammates that played an unprecedented season in the spring of 2021.

Jake entered his junior season healthy, excited to play, and with an increased football IQ after watching from the sideline the previous year. He played in all 15 games at defensive end and finished with 17 total tackles. He tied

a career-high with three tackles in the NCAA semifinal win over James Madison, including a sack and rush for no gain on back-to-back plays. The Bison went on to win their ninth National Championship game.

"It was crazy," he recalls of the Frisco, Texas game. "I would say I've been a part of three championships. The first one I was a red-shirt. I wasn't one of the guys. For the second one, I was hurt all season. But, I was a big part of this past one."

SUCCESS OFF THE FIELD

Jake's success isn't limited to the playing field. He earned a spot on the Missouri Valley Football Conference (MVFC) honor roll in the 2018, 2020-21, and 2021 seasons and was awarded the MVFC Commissioner's Academic Excellence Award for the 2020-21 and 2021 seasons. He also completed his undergraduate degree in Business this past December, in just three and a half years, while playing Division I football and rehabbing a significant injury.

"I think coming from Shanley, it prepares you. It probably over-prepares you for college. College seemed pretty easy," he says with a smile. "I'm halfway to a Master's in Business Administration."

Jake is eligible to play another year of football, but this will be his last season. "I'm ready. It's going to be bittersweet. Going to the last summer workout, my last fall camp, and last season. It's all bittersweet, but I'm definitely ready. I'm ready to move on."

Jake has gotten a taste of the working world, having done a year-and-a-half internship at Sanford in Community Relations

Relations.

In the early planning stages of the Roger Maris All-Star week, Sanford was working closely with Shanley, Roger Maris' Alma mater, to run various sports clinics. They were also looking for an intern to help with the event. Jake was recommended. The Roger Maris/Shanley connection and the benefits the school receives from the event were enough to sell Jake on the opportunity. He did various speaking engagements to help promote the event and was a part of the daily happenings of the All-Star week.

"I had some people ask me, 'Why do you care so much about this?' Obviously, it's helping Shanley, but if my name is attached to anything I do, I want to make sure it's successful and take ownership of it. If I had done a terrible job, it would have been my fault, and it's easy to fall back on the fact that I'm an intern. But, if my name is in it, I'll do it 100%."


Jake attributes learning that mentality to his parents, Ed and Mary. "I grew up in a small family-owned business, from the time I was five years old," Jake explains of his parent's business Ed's Marine. "Growing up in that family and seeing how hard my dad and mom worked was instilled in my brother, Joe, and me. Whatever you're doing, put your nose to the grindstone, keep working at it, and it will work out."

Jake has much to be proud of as he reflects on his Bison career. He'll miss his teammates more than the tackles but is excited for his steps after football and offers this advice, "Be where your feet are. The future will take care of itself. Whatever happened in the past is in the past. You can't change it, so wherever your feet are just be where your feet are. Be present."

Work hard. Be personable. Have high character. Be humble. Be like Jake, and success will follow.



SPOTLIGHT: Couch Chiley Strong

Successful athletes are the product of many factors. Sacrifice, dedication, drive, and quality coaching to help them reach their God-given ability are just a few. Shanley Athletics is lucky to have Anthony Carlquist (aka AC) and his commitment to improving our athletes' strength and conditioning over the last sixteen years.

THE BEGINNING

Originally from Carson City, Nevada, AC found his way to North Dakota via a football scholarship to Mayville State. He completed his student teaching at JPII and started as a volunteer coach at Shanley in 2006.

"I was working a construction job at the time, and I would end my day and come to the school and have the weight room open from 3:30 until 5:30," AC remembers. "I always thought it was important that the weight room was open. I hated if kids felt they had to leave and go somewhere else, so I always tried to have the weight room open Monday through Friday."

The weight room was open. Now AC needed to fill it.

THE EVOLUTION

AC eventually accepted a part-time PE teacher position at the middle school that turned into a full-time job in 2009. How was he going to get more kids in the weight room? "At first, the younger crew, the middle school, would always come in," AC recalls. "The kids in high school had been there for so long and not using the weight room. We had to think hard about how to get them in. We had one of the state's nicest, newest weight rooms, but many kids didn't even come in once in their four years at Shanley."

AC knew he needed a way to introduce weight training to the kids. Making it a part of the physical education curriculum would be ideal, but it would be a hard sale for some. "I remember one PE teacher looking at me like I had a third eye and saying, 'Are you crazy? No, I'm not doing that. We're just going to play kickball," AC recalls with a laugh, but it didn't deter him.

At the time, one weight training class was offered in the fall, with less than ten students participating. AC wanted that class and eventually got it. Now how could he show other students what they were doing in class? "Working with AD Randy Nelson, we created standards in attendance and lifting requirements to allow lettering in weightlifting," AC says.

His class gained more interest but saw far more boys than girls. "It was important that we get our girls involved because our girls were so talented and hard-working at Shanley," AC remembers. "Getting them comfortable in our weight room with the PE program would be the key."

Now AC had the support of another PE teacher, Luke Rustad. "We started working together and establishing what's appropriate for each level from sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth grade to beyond," AC says.

"Working together with other coaches, other teachers, and making sure they're comfortable with the curriculum, making sure that we're all coaching to the same standards was a big part of making it successful. One of the great problems we have now is that there's always a waiting list to get into weight training class," AC says with a smile.

Athletes were seeing gains during the school year, and AC wanted to make sure those gains weren't lost in the summer. "A summer strength and conditioning camp was almost unheard of at the time," AC recalls. "I remember a few teachers and coaches who said, 'You'll never get anybody to come to that camp. They're all going to be doing something else. They're too busy.""

The first summer, 33 athletes participated. "I started talking to more coaches and the next year, I got a few other coaches on board, and we went to 66 kids. I kept talking, and it continued to grow each summer. This past summer, over 200 athletes participated in the strength and conditioning program."

AC has continued to find ways to engage kids and increase participation. "We've incorporated more in the PE classes, offered an after-school program, and started celebrating strength," he says. Outside the weight room are plaques recognizing athletes in the Bent Bar Club, which is the total weight lifted in a single rep of squat, bench, and clean added together, as well as a top 10 listing of the top lifters, both girls and boys, for each lift.

"I think it allows everyone to participate and, like every other sport you're in, recognizes your effort," AC explains.

This past year, AC also upgraded the weight room, allowing more kids to train at a time more efficiently. "Having the heavy-duty squat racks that transition right into a bench press, which could go from a flat back bench press to an incline to a squat rack to an overhead press, has been huge," AC says.

"Everything is high-level and customized with our Shanley logo. It looks professional, and it sells the school and weight training. I think the kids are hard-working and deserve something to match what they put into it."

Donations from the Shanley Athletic Club and former Shanley athlete Connor McGovern made the weight room upgrade possible, and AC sees a correlation between the new equipment and athlete success. "I started looking at our numbers this year, and I'm like, our girls are unbelievably strong, and so are our boys. I don't remember having this many 300-pound benches. I don't remember this many girls being able to clean 135 pounds. I think the new equipment, being more efficient, and utilizing everything is a big part of it."

THE SUCCESS

"Participation is a big part of it," AC says of how he measures success. "We've seen the number of girls increase and they're doing super, super well and recognizing that lifting makes you feel good, athletic, and strong."

AC explains that the strength program is there to help the kids be better. "We want all the programs to succeed in everything they do, prevent injuries, and stay on the playing field."



AC quickly points out it isn't just him; he has lots of support. "The coaching staff has trusted us, and that has been huge. Stefan Webber, Luke Rustad, and Brock Ellingson have been a huge help. My name might be the main one tied to the strength and conditioning program, but working with those guys has elevated the program."

While he's humble, there is no denying the positive impact AC has on Shanley and our athletes. Luckily Shanley has had a positive effect on AC too.

"It's fun. I love this place," AC shares. "My three boys go to school here. I'm very lucky to do what I do. It doesn't ever really feel like I work, It's been a lot of fun. The people, that's why I stay. It's just a good place to be."


COACHES COMMENTS



Concussions: Do We Have a Treatment?

In 2022, do we have anything better for the brain after a concussion than just "rest"? Healing with Hyperbarics of North Dakota, PLLC thinks so. They have been treating concussions here in Fargo, using hyperbaric oxygen [HBO] treatments since 2018. Clinic founder, Daphne Denham MD FACS FACCWS, developed a "TREAT a concussion" protocol and the clinic has *TREAT*ed over 1000 concussions. Shanley graduate, class of 1982, Allan Luistro MD, is the current medical director at Healing with Hyperbarics.

With an estimated 3 million concussions (or mild traumatic brain injuries) occurring yearly, we need a solution. One of the biggest problems, the scariest aspect for parents of an injured child, is that there is not a standardized, accepted diagnostic tool; and worse, not an effective treatment. We have a solution, both to diagnose, and treat, a concussion. We need to appreciate the brain and its energy requirements to best understand concussions. Brain cells are like elite athletes; they function using oxygen and glucose to make energy and they use more of these resources than any other cells. A concussion typically causes an injury to brain cells, rather than complete cell death. These injured cells require dramatically more energy to repair themselves, but after a concussion, the brain receives less blood flow than normal meaning less oxygen and glucose to make energy. Therefore, at a time when these cells need more energy, they are getting far less than normal.



HBO treatments are simple, safe and the best way we can get oxygen into the injured tissue. A treatment involves breathing 100% oxygen in a medical grade chamber (pictured), at varying increased pressures, allowing one thousand percent more oxygen to dissolve into the liquid part of the blood. The resulting high oxygen does three basic things: it gets the needed increase of oxygen to the brain cells to allow them to repair; it decreases swelling of the tissues; and lastly it turns off the inflammatory response. A recent publication from early August 2022, in the Journal of American Medical Association (JAMA) looked at the outcomes of patients with mild traumatic brain injuries, or concussions. The study reviewed a total of 991 participants. At 2 weeks post-injury, 76% of these participants had an incomplete recovery defined as not returning to baseline or preinjury life. At 6 months 56% still had an incomplete recovery. This emphasizes the need to treat all concussions as soon as they are sustained and not wait for them to not get better.



We are using BrainScope, an FDA cleared device to help aid in diagnosing a concussion, to show HBO sessions are effective. BrainScope is an EEG based brain biomarker that produces a score between 0-100, with less than 70 being diagnostic of a concussion. [Greater than 70 and the student is cleared to return to play.] Over the years, many publications have described the prolonged recovery and multiple complications concussion patients have. Using the "TREAT a Concussion" protocol, we are seeing patients score above 70 after an average of less than 4 treatments, if the concussion is treated within the first week of injury. Often when 2 treatments are given a day, the concussion is resolved within 2 days. We are the only clinic in the area that is using the BrainScope data to aid in concussion diagnosis. We can also treat post-concussive symptoms with HBO, but it takes longer, and more treatments are needed. This is why it is important to see patients with concussions as soon as the injury is sustained: the result is fewer treatments and a far quicker recovery. We only have one brain to take us through life. What are we willing to do to repair and protect that brain?

SHANLEY FISHING TEAM by Chad Engels, Shanley Fishing Team Coach

The Shanley Fishing Team wrapped up its inaugural season this August and brought home a championship to boot. It was a great ending to our first year. The team is a part of the Lake Agassiz High School Fishing League, which was created in 2019. Nine North Dakota High Schools in the Fargo area have teams that compete in the league. Schools include Fargo North, Fargo South, Davies, West Fargo, Sheyenne, Horace, Central Cass, Oak Grove, and now Shanley. In all, there were nearly 170 student anglers that participated this year.

The Shanley Fishing Team was assembled in early 2022 with signup in February. At the conclusion of signup, 12 student anglers made up the inaugural team. Building a team of anglers to compete is just a part of the equation however.

The tournaments require boats and as a result Boat Captains are needed. Several individuals stepped forward to help, including Shanley alumni, Shanley Dads, and a couple other volunteers. In all, the team had 8 Boat Captains.

The league hosts 4 regular season tournaments within two divisions: Open and Varsity. The regular season tournaments are a boat against boat format, schools do not compete as teams. Boats can have 2 to 3 anglers depending on the division. However, the season culminates with School Championships in both the Open and Varsity divisions. Each school is allowed to enter 3 boats in the Championship events and all 3 boats work together to score the best 15 fish for their School in a 4 hour tournament format. The winners of these two tournaments are the Season Champions. Shanley had a remarkable showing for its first year winning the Season Championship in the Open and placing 3rd in Varsity. The winners received individual trophies and a team trophy for the school display case.

Signup for the 2023 season will begin in January. Team meetings and league seminars will begin in February and are held on Tuesday evenings. The meetings are educational with the purpose of building angling knowledge and skills. Tournaments are held June through August.

THE DEACONS

Our nickname, "Deacons," was adopted in the fall of 1934 for the teams of Sacred Heart Academy, forerunner of Shanley High School, and has been used ever since.

It is especially fitting for Catholic schools, since it is derived from the Greek and literally means "servants" or "those who serve" (Acts 6). The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us that Jesus "made Himself the 'Deacon' or servant of all" (CCC 1570).

In light of our schools' mission, identity, and nickname, we expect our students to excel in serving God and neighbor.



THE SHIELD

The Shanley Shield first appeared on football helmets in the fall of 1973. It was designed by Shanley art teacher Sr. Mary Virginia Deibert, PBVM with the help of her art students.

The shield signifies strength. The cross of Christ is centered on the shield as it is the center of our Catholic faith. The "5" represents "Shanley" high school, named for Bishop John Shanley (1852-1909), who served as first bishop of the Fargo Catholic Diocese.

Graduation from Shanley High School is the capstone for the St. John Paul II Catholic Schools student experience as Deacons.
